The series will welcome a wide range of topics, but the ideal project will both address the recent past and be methodologically innovative. **Since 1970** will feature titles in social and cultural history; the history of science, environment, and technology; the history of race, immigration, and ethnicity; and political histories that construe the category of “politics” broadly.

She is at work on a new book, tentatively entitled *Justice Delayed: Civil Rights Trials and America’s Racial Reckoning*, which explores contemporary prosecutions of civil rights era crimes.

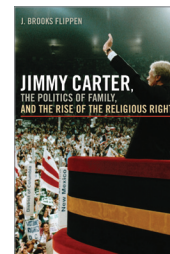
